NEIGHBORHOOD HOUSE: Our first planning meeting for this project will be Friday, March 11, from 9:00 to 10:00 a.m. via Zoom. If you wish to

The project is to work with The Shack in Monongalia County in its outreach to students attending Eastwood, Mason Dixon, Mylan Park, and Ridgedale elementary schools to improve the quality of life in our community by promoting literacy and awareness of social justice issues while also promoting education to prepare students for work in the future. The Shack currently offers before-school and/or after-school care for students at these schools.

Note that the 51st District, which covers most of Monongalia County, has now been divided into five separate districts. Instead of voting for up to five members of the House of Delegates, you will only vote for one member for each district. Monongalia County is comprised of House of Delegates Districts 77-82 on the map.

STATE-WIDE AND AREA EVENTS

West Virginia Legislature Is In Session: The legislative session started January 12th. While the information here is current as of "press time," nothing is finished until the legislature concludes at midnight on March 12th.

You can go to www.wvlegislature.gov/Bill_Status/bill_status.cfm to search by bill number or subject. This will identify the delegates and senators who introduced the bill, the committees considering it, and its status. Sometimes nothing happens on a bill that is introduced, and it dies at midnight on March 12th. Sometimes it gets through one committee or one branch of the legislature but dies in a second committee or in the second branch. Sometimes bills move very quickly so it is important to let your legislators know your opinion. The next important deadline is

"cross-over day," March 2. This means that bills introduced in the House of Delegates or Senate must clear the House or Senate, respectively, by midnight on that day, to allow time for consideration by the other chamber, time for conference committee work on amendments, etc.

Most of Monongalia County is in House District 51 (Delegates Barbara Fleischauer, Evan Hansen, Joe Statler, Danielle Walker, and John Williams) and Senate District 13 (Senators Bob Beach and Mike Caputo).

THE WEST VIRGINIA COALITION FOR TRUTH IN HISTORY STILL NEEDS YOUR HELP

Last month, we focused on SB 498, cynically titled the "Anti-Racism Act of 2022." It was introduced into the Senate Education Committee, but no further action took place on that bill.

The next focus was **HB 4011**, which passed out of the House Education Committee quickly and moved to the House Judiciary Committee. Our extensive lobbying seems to have paid off, as, on February 25th, the House Judiciary Committee vote 13-9 to send the bill to a study committee for consideration for the next legislative session. In addition to overwhelming opposition at a public hearing from educators, parents, religious leaders, and others, and numerous phone

calls and emails to legislators, there were editorials in newspapers around the state opposing this bill. It is still possible that the substance of this bill might get amended into **SB 704**,

HB 704, allowing parents, grandparents, and guardians to inspect instructional materials in classroom, which passed out of the Senate Education Committee and is up for first reading in the Senate on February 28th. HB 4016, Creating The Anti-Racism, Anti-Sexism, and Prevention of Political-Economic Bias in School Curriculum and Pedagogy Act of 2022, did not get out of the House Education Committee.

SB 587, Providing tip line to report teaching of critical race theory, did not get out of the Senate Education Committee.

FAIRNESS TRACKING LGBTQ+-RELATED LEGISLATION: Fairness is working on several bills that affect LGBTQ+ West Virginians. You can sign up to get alerts on these bills at https://fairnesswv.org/legislation/.

HB 2232 apparently died at the House Judiciary Committee level. That bill would have allowed provided a process by which a city may hold an election to recall an ordinance. It was widely considered to be a means by which communities could recall any ordinance that protected human rights at the local level, like repealing Morgantown's CROWN Act.

HB 269, the **Youth Mental Health Protection Act,** which would have enabled the state to revoke the license of any medical practitioner that subjects a child to conversion therapy, died at the committee level.

The **Fairness Act** (Prohibiting unlawful discriminatory practices covered by Human Rights Act and Fair Housing Act) would expand the state's human rights ordinance to include banning discrimination in employment and public accommodation based on sexual orientation, gender identity, or familial status. This is **SB 156** and a companion bill, **HB 2538**, both died at the committee level.

SB 256 and **HB** 2697 both died in committee. These said that "All persons within the boundaries of the State of West Virginia have the right to be free from any violence, or intimidation by threat of violence, committed against their persons or property because of their race, color, religion, ancestry, national origin, political affiliation, or sex, disability, gender identity, or sexual orientation."

HB 2232 died in the House Judiciary Committee. It would have provided a process by which a city may hold an election to recall an ordinance. There is a general consensus that this could be used to recall ordinances that provide protections that are not otherwise covered by state law. For Morgantown, this could have included the CROWN ordinance and the ban on conversion therapy.

HB 2698 and its companion bill, **SB 148**, would have prohibited "racial discrimination based on certain hair textures and hairstyles." Both bills died at the committee level.

Women's History Month: honors the vital role of women in American history

- 3/2 Ash Wednesday (Christian): a day of prayer and fasting, Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent
- 3/8 International Women's Day: celebrates the various (social, economic, cultural, political) achievements of women
- 3/10 Birthday of Harriet Tubman (Black American): abolitionist and activist, best known for her role on the Underground Railroad
- 3/17 St. Patrick's Day (Irish): Feast of Saint Patrick, a cultural and religious celebration held around the world
- 3/21 International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination (United Nations): after an incident in which police killed 69 people in South Africa in 1960, the UN created this event to call for elimination of racial discrimination
- 3/19 Holi (Hindu): holidays celebrating the winter harvest and the onset of spring
