PRESERVING OUR HISTORY: In August we donated two bankers' boxes of our records of our first 15 years to the West Virginia University West Virginia and Regional History Center. We will soon be transferring photos of our events and copies of our Update to the Center. We hope these records will help people interested in social justice groups around the county and state.



Joan Browning donates copies of her book: Deep in Our Hearts: Nine White Women in the Freedom Movement by "is an eloquent and powerful book that takes us into the lives of nine young women who came of age in the 1960s while committing themselves actively and passionately to the struggle for racial equality and justice. The book delves into the hearts of the women to ask searching questions. Why did they, of all the white women growing up in their hometowns, cross the color line in the days of segregation and join the Southern Freedom Movement? What did they see, do, think, and feel in those uncertain but hopeful days? And how did their experiences shape the rest of their lives?"







Fairness has also announced that "As summer break comes to a close and students head back to the classroom, our team is proud to be in the third year of our Safe & Healthy Schools Initiative. With this program, we're working all year round to make sure LGBTQ+ youth can learn and grow in the kind of supportive classrooms all students deserve.

"We got the idea to start the Safe & Healthy Schools Initiative during the COVID-19 pandemic. As schools closed that year, dozens and dozens of parents, teachers and volunteers reached out to us with concerns about a young person in their life who is a member of the LGBTQ+ community. They were managing feelings of isolation, feeling burdened by a national campaign of anti-LGBTQ+ legislation, or struggling at home. We realized that West Virginia had a crisis on its hands, and we wanted to help.

"Research from GLSEN showed that, in 2021, 70 percent of LGBTQ+ students in our state experienced at least one form of anti-LGBTQ+ discrimination at school. Most teachers in our state want all students to feel safe and supported at school, but they don't always have the resources or skills to make that happen. That's where we come in.

"In 2022, Paula Kerner, a longtime Kanawha County educator and veteran GSA sponsor, joined our team to officially launch the Safe & Healthy Schools Initiative. She spends her time traveling across the state training educators on how to make their classrooms more inclusive, how to address bullying and harassment, and how to encourage a vibrant student life that encourages everyone to be their best.

"Our annual gala is one crucial way that you can help fund Paula's work to make our schools more safe and supportive for LGBTQ+ students."




Executive Director Search Still Open: The ACLU of West Virginia is searching for a new executive director through Axis Talent Partners. The position description and application are available at

National Hispanic Heritage Month: Observed from September 15 to October 15, this national month celebrates the culture and contributions of Hispanics and Latin Americans to the United States. The anniversaries of many Latin American countries are held on or around September 15 hence why the start of the month starts mid-month. In the United States, it's a leading cause of death and is an important topic to discuss with loved ones.
