The Human Rights Commission will be presenting its annual awards on Sunday, December 8, from 4:00 to 6:00 p.m. at the Aull Center (Garlow House), 351 Spruce Street, next to the Morgantown Public Library on Spruce Street. Eve Faulkes will receive the award for an individual, and MAYSP will receive the award for an organization.

There will be free parking in City parking lots. There will be a violinist for accompaniment, Shairah Sanchez; she is an undergraduate student in the WVU Music Program. Food and beverages are being donated by the Suncrest Towne Center Starbucks, as they were last year. The Starbucks on Beechurst is also joining in. Champion Trophies is engraving the awards at a 'special price'. The Human Rights Commission appreciates the support from these businesses.

The poster and flag exhibition should be open by Wednesday, December 4, and run through Saturday, December 21. The show will be open Monday and Tuesday from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Wednesday-Friday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., and Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.

There will be an art and essay contest for all Morgantown K-12 students. The content must be human rights-related and there will be monetary awards for the best entries. December 2: International Day for the Abolition of Slavery – Slavery is not just history but affects over 30 million persons throughout the world today. Its roots are in discrimination, poverty and indebtedness, vulnerability, and the rule of law.

December 3: International Day of Disabled Persons – Raises awareness about persons with disabilities in order to improve their lives and provide them with equal opportunity.

December 10: International Human Rights Day – On this day in 1948 the United Nations General Assembly adopted the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

December 16: Bill of Rights Day – Commemorates the signing into law of the ten original amendments of the United States Constitution in 1791 – including the First Amendment Rights of religion, association, speech, petition, and press.

December 18: International Migrants Day – A day to affirm commitment to diverse and open societies which provide opportunities and lives of dignity for all migrants.


resident of the city or an active member of an organization that works within the city to promote purposes consistent with the purpose of the Board."



In mid-November, "members of the Wardensville Town Council voted unanimously to adopt our local fairness law, an ordinance that protects its residents from anti-LGBTQ+ discrimination in employment, housing and public spaces.

"Wardensville became the 20th community in West Virginia to adopt a local fairness law, and it is the first community in Hardy County to do so. According to Census data from 2020, less than 300 people live in the town."

ACLU-WV Bus to Washington, D.C. - Skrmetti SCOTUS Case

We're headed to D.C. to rally for gender affirming care and we want you to join us!

On December 4, the Supreme Court will hear oral arguments in the Skrmetti case. Samantha and Brian

Williams of Nashville, TN and their 15-year-old transgender daughter are challenging a Tennessee law banning gender-affirming care for transgender people under 18. Tennessee is home to over 3,000 transgender adolescents and the health care banned by this law is supported by the entire mainstream of the medical community.

Join some fellow West Virginians on the bus to D.C. on December 4 and make your voice heard. The bus will pick up passengers in Charleston (approx. 1:30 am) Morgantown (approx. 4:30 am) and Martinsburg (approx. 7:30 am) and driving into D.C. for the rally. The bus will depart D.C. at 3 pm and make stops in the same locations (Martinsburg approx. 5 pm, Morgantown approx. 7 pm, Charleston approx. 10 pm). If you would like to meet the West Virginia group in Washington, D.C. please complete the form and select 'meet the group in D.C.' where applicable so we can stay in touch and connect in D.C. *The bus is ADA accessible.



December 1: World AIDS Day-World AIDS Day is observed annually to unite people worldwide in the fight against HIV, show support for those living with HIV, and commemorate those who have died from an AIDS-related illness. Founded in 1988, it was the first ever global health day. Participate in local events or wear a red ribbon to show your support.

December 2: International Day for the Abolition of Slavery-Slavery isn't just something from the past. Nearly 40 million people across the world are in modern slavery and live in forced labor and marriages or human trafficking. The UN created this diversity day to raise awareness on how to work to eradicate this modern slavery form.

December 3: International Day of Persons with Disabilities-Today, we promote the well-being and equal rights of people with disabilities. This call-to-action day aims to improve their living conditions and raise awareness about how to work toward accessibility in every aspect of society. We hope to better understand the challenges they face while focusing on breaking down barriers and building a more inclusive world for everyone.

December 20: International Human Solidarity Day-Today is dedicated to raising awareness of the importance of solidarity to help advance the eradication of poverty. The first day featured a keynote address from Lech Walesa, the former president of Poland and the cofounder of the labor union Solidarity, which inspired this movement.

December 25: Christmas-Christmas is one of the most cherished Christian holidays commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ. Observed by millions around the world, both religiously and culturally, this day is marked by attending church services, exchanging gifts, and festive family gatherings. Decorations include Christmas trees, lights, and nativity scenes that symbolize joy and peace.

December 26 – January 1, 2025: Kwanzaa- The week-long celebration celebrates African American heritage and culture. Each day features a different principle including unity, self-determination, collective work and responsibility, cooperative economics, purpose, creativity, and faith.
