WE WILL BE AT PRIDE DAY ON JUNE 14TH AT THE HAZEL RUBY MCQUAIN RIVERFRONT PARK IN MORGANTOWN. Look for our table and exhibit at this event. We will have copies of *West Virginians' Experiences in Civil Rights: How We Have Been Connected All Along* for \$15.90 each and can take payments by cash, check, card, or Venmo. SAVE THE DATE FOR PRESENTATION BY ILENE EVANS ON THURSDAY, AUGUST 7: The Voting Rights Act of 1965 was signed on August 6, 1965. We will celebrate that event on August 7th at 6:00 p.m. at the Morgantown Public Library, 373 Spruce Street. Ilene Evans will portray **Coralie Franklin Cook** (1861-1942), a descendant of those enslaved at Thomas Jefferson's Monticello. According to the Monticello website, "In 1880, Coralie Franklin graduated from Storer College in Harpers Ferry, WV. From this time, she was widely noted as a powerful public speaker. She taught elocution and English at Storer and then at Howard University.

"In 1898 she married George William Cook (1855-1931), a Howard University professor and trustee. Coralie Cook served for twelve years as a member of the District of Columbia Board of Education. She was a founder of the National Association of Colored Women and a committed suffragist. About 1910, the Cooks became followers of the Baha'i faith. A longtime friend and admirer of Susan B. Anthony, she eventually became disillusioned by the women's suffrage movement, feeling it had 'turned its back on the woman of color'" (<https://gettingword.monticello.org/people/coralie-franklin-cook/>).

We will also have an exhibit based on the Voting Rights Act, including a panel on the dramatic story of West Virginia's ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution that granted suffrage to women (well, to almost all women – come to the exhibit to see who gets left out).

Although we did not get new funding from the City of Morgantown this year, we are authorized to spend \$1499.72 that we did not use in previous authorizations to support this program, and we appreciate that opportunity.



According to the City of Morgantown's website, "Appointments of to the Commission are made by City Council, and all must be residents of the City. All seats are non-ward specific." Here are the events for June:

LGBT Pride Month – Commemorates the anniversary of the June 28, 1969 Stonewall riot in New York City, the incident that initiated the modern gay rights movement in the United States. LGBT (lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender) Pride Day is the last Sunday in June.

June 1: Stand for Children Day – A day to emphasize the importance of standing up for children by supporting systemic change and increased funding for public education.

June 5: World Environment Day – Observance promoting an awareness of the impact of environmental conditions on individual and community well-being and food sources which make life possible for current and future generations.

June 8: World Oceans Day – Call for awareness of the importance of protecting oceans from pollution and rising sea levels to prevent individuals and entire communities from loss of property, housing, livelihood and food supplies.

June 12: Loving Day – Observes the anniversary of the 1967 United States Supreme Court decision *Loving v. Virginia* which struck down the miscegenation laws in 16 states barring interracial marriage.

June 14: Race Unity Day – Observance promoting racial harmony and understanding and the essential unity of humanity.

June 19: Juneteenth – Originally commemorating the announcement of the abolition of slavery in Texas in 1865, it is now celebrated throughout the United States to honor African-American freedom and achievement.

June 20 World Refugee Day – Raises awareness about the plight of refugees and displaced persons.

June 26 United Nations International Day in Support of Victims of Torture - A day to remind people that human torture is not only unacceptable – it is also a crime and a universal violation of a human right.

The Morgantown-Monongalia County League of Women Voters' held their annual meeting on May 21, 2025. The guest speaker for the evening was Professor John E. Taylor, JD, PhD from the WVU College of Law. The topic of the presentation was "A Republic, If You Can Keep It." The discussion focused on protecting Constitutional rights, why we need to watch closely what the equal branches of government are protecting or violating The Constitution and the importance of staying engaged, speaking up and showing up to protect our Constitutional Republic.

The proposed program priorities for the LWV-United States and the LWV-MM are reaffirmed including the following:

Voting and Democracy: We remain focused on protecting the rights of every citizen and to continue to encourage informed participation in our government.







June 2*: Jewish: Shavuot – Shavuot celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai, a central event in Jewish history. Observed with study, prayers, and dairy meals, it's a time to reflect on the teachings and values of the Torah.

June 7*: Islamic: Eid al-Adha – Eid al-Adha, the Festival of Sacrifice, commemorates Prophet Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son in obedience to God. Muslims observe this day with prayers, charitable giving, and the sharing of meals to honor faith and compassion.

June 8: Christian: Pentecost – Pentecost marks the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles, celebrated as the "birthday" of the Christian Church. Christians observe this day with prayers, gatherings, and reflections on spiritual empowerment and community.

June 19: Roman Catholic: Feast of Corpus Christi – The Feast of Corpus Christi celebrates the Eucharist and the presence of Christ in the sacrament, central to Catholic worship. It's marked by processions, prayer, and adoration, affirming faith in the sacred nature of the Eucharist.

June 29: Christian: St. Peter and St. Paul Day – This day honors the apostles Peter and Paul, celebrated as foundational figures in Christianity. Christians remember their dedication, courage, and contributions to the early Church through prayer and gatherings.
