JOIN US ON THURSDAY, AUGUST 7 FROM 6:00 P.M. TO 8:00 P.M. AT THE MOUNTAINEER MALL TO CELEBRATE THE 60TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE VOTING RIGHTS ACT.

The Voting Rights Act of 1965 was signed on August 6, 1965. We will celebrate that event on August 7th at 6:00 p.m. in Classroom B at the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (OLLI) at the Mountaineer Mall, 5000 Greenbag Road. We will also have light refreshments and a new exhibit in Classroom A.

We will also have a **Zoom option** for those who are not able to attend in person.

To get the Zoom link, you must register in advance at https://olliatwvu.wufoo.com/forms/m2fl5u40czj5lw/. You will then get the link for the program that morning. We ask that you also register if you plan to attend in person, although that is not a requirement.

This program is free and open to the public

At 6:30 p.m., Ilene Evans will portray Coralie Franklin Cook (1861-1942), a descendant of those enslaved at Thomas Jefferson's Monticello. According to the Monticello website, "In 1880, Coralie Franklin graduated from Storer College in Harpers Ferry, WV. From this time, she was widely noted as a powerful public speaker. She taught elocution and English at Storer and then at Howard University.

"In 1898 she married George William Cook (1855-1931), a Howard University professor and trustee. Coralie Cook served for twelve years as a member of the District of Columbia Board of Education. She was a founder of the National Association of Colored Women and a committed suffragist. About 1910, the Cooks became followers of the Baha'i faith. A longtime friend and admirer of Susan B. Anthony, she eventually became disillusioned by the women's suffrage movement, feeling it had 'turned its back on the woman of color'" (https://gettingword.monticello.org/people/coralie-franklin-cook/).

We will also have an exhibit based on the Voting Rights Act, including a panel on the dramatic story of West Virginia's ratification of the 19th Amendment to the Constitution that granted suffrage to women (well, to almost all women – come to the exhibit to see who gets left out). Eve Faulkes desgned the exhibit panels, and we appreciate the support of First Presbyterian Church, Morgantown; the Morgantown Human Rights Commission; and the Morgantown/Kingwood Branch of the NAACP. The exhibit will then move to the second floor of the Morgantown Public Library, 373 Spruce Street, for the rest of the month of August.

We appreciate the financial support of the City of Morgantown for this program. We also appreciate the support of Jascenna Haislet, director of OLLI, for her assistance in making this event possible.

Vacancies on Human Rights Commission. There are currently three vacancies on the commission. "Appointments of to the Commission are made by City Council, and all must be residents of the City. All seats are non-ward specific." Here are the events for August:

August 6: National Night Out – Marks the importance of collaborative efforts in reducing crime and for strengthening neighborhood relationships which help prevent crime and protect persons from criminal activity.

August 9: International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples – Celebrates the richness of indigenous cultures and recognizes the challenges indigenous peoples face today, ranging from poverty and disease to dispossession, discrimination, and denial of basic human rights.

August 12: International Youth Day – Celebrates young people and the integral role they play to create a world fit for children.

August 23: International Day for the Remembrance of Slave Trade and Its Abolition – Memorializes the tragedy of the transatlantic slave trade, coinciding with the anniversary of the uprising in Santa Domingo (today Haiti and the Dominican Republic) that initiated its abolition. Tragically other forms of slavery still persist today.

August 30: International Day of the Victims of Enforced Disappearance – A day to promote taking a stand against secret imprisonment, forced disappearance and abduction and placing persons in any situation without access to relatives and/or legal representation.



August 7: Purple Heart Day – Today, remember Americans who have been wounded in battle, have done courageous acts while at war or who gave their life for our freedoms. Purple represents bravery and courage and it is the oldest military decoration presented to service members in the United States. It was first created by George Washington in 1782.

August 9: International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples – The International Day of the World's Indigenous Peoples hopes to raise awareness about the rights and contributions of indigenous populations worldwide. Today, start a dialogue about the indigenous communities and society by understanding the challenges they face such as marginalization.

August 26: Women's Equality Day – This day remembers the passage of the 19th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution in 1920, which gave women the right to vote. Celebrate the achievements of women in history this month. Remember the ongoing struggle for gender equality and women's rights every day.

August 31: International Day of People of African Descent – This day was established by the United Nations to celebrate the rich heritage and contributions of people of African descent worldwide, and to promote the full inclusion of people of African descent in all aspects of society. It also aims to combat racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia, and related intolerance that people of African descent face globally.

August Awareness Months

Black Business Month: This month, we honor Black-owned businesses in the United States. First celebrated in 2004, there are 2.6 million Black-owned businesses in America. This month hopes to push for equity in the business space and celebrate those who own a business despite daily challenges.

Intersectionality Awareness Month: Intersectionality is the idea that someone identifies with two or more marginalized groups, including gender identity or race. It's important to try to understand the experiences that all people have with their identity. A diverse and inclusive workplace and world means that we uplift disadvantaged societal groups. By spreading awareness, we are promoting positive change.

National Civility Month: This month focuses on treating others the way we want to treat others with respect and kindness. This should be something celebrated every month, but in August, it's a main focus for the month.

August Interfaith Calendar Highlights

August 1*: Pagan and Wiccan: Lughnasadh – Lughnasadh, also known as Lammas, celebrates the beginning of the harvest season, honoring the abundance of the earth. Pagans and Wiccans observe the day with feasts, gatherings, and offerings, expressing gratitude for nature's bounty.

August 6: Eastern Orthodox Christian: The Transfiguration of Christ – This day commemorates the Transfiguration of Jesus, where his divinity was revealed to his disciples on Mount Tabor. Eastern Orthodox Christians mark the day with prayers and blessings, reflecting on spiritual transformation and renewal.

August 15: Eastern Orthodox Christian, Roman Catholic: The Assumption – The Assumption celebrates the belief that the Virgin Mary was taken into heaven, body and soul. Observed with masses and processions, it is a day of reverence and celebration of Mary's significance in the faith.

August 21: Jain: Paryushana – Paryushana is a significant festival in Jainism, focusing on reflection, fasting, and forgiveness. It's a time for Jains to seek spiritual growth, make amends, and deepen their commitment to nonviolence and compassion.

August 27: Hindu: Ganesh Chaturthi – Ganesh Chaturthi celebrates the birth of Lord Ganesha, the remover of obstacles and patron of wisdom. Hindus honor Ganesha with prayers, offerings, and festivities, seeking blessings for prosperity and new beginnings.
